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
Why we're here:



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

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Why a Stage Gate approach?

- It's a starting point
- Establishes a structured approach
- Creates checks and balances through natural check-ins and leadership visibility






Stage Gate

Stage: where the work is done and the questions are answered

Gate: where decisions are made (not a status meeting)



Stages from Intent Workshop








Stage Intent

Example: In this stage, teams should be identifying user problems and conducting rapid test and learn cycles to determine what initial desirable ideas(s) could solve those problems, and measuring against decision criteria





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Gate Decisions

Go: the work is on-track, move to the next Stage

No/Go (Kill): there doesn't appear to be enough evidence to move forward. Stop working, no more resources for the initiative

Recycle: there are still unanswered questions or more work to be done. Stay in the current Stage and come back to the Gate later

Hold: there's interest in the work, but it's not a priority for the moment. Capture any learnings, and hold off any more work for the time being. The initiative might be revived at a later date.
